Maundy Thursday marks the beginning of the great Easter celebration. The word "maundy" is derived from the Latin word mandatum, the first word of the Latin phrase "Mandatum novum do vobis ut diligatis invicem sicut dilexi vos" ("A new commandment I give unto you, that you love one another as I have loved you"), the statement used by Jesus in John's gospel to explain the significance of washing the disciples' feet. Maundy Thursday is also the night that Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper with the words, "Do this in remembrance of me." As a way to remember the final events that night, the service concludes with the Stripping of the Altar during which all the worship articles and adornments are removed from the altar. This symbolizes both the suspension of Holy Communion, which is not celebrated on Good Friday, and the abandonment and humiliation of Jesus Christ.

During the season of Lent, the crosses carried in our processions and on the altar are draped in purple, the color of repentance and preparation. The crosses will remained draped from Ash Wednesday to Palm Sunday. On Palm Sunday, the cloth will change to red, and will remain through Maundy Thursday in preparation for Jesus's crucifixion. On Good Friday, the crosses will be draped in black, symbolizing Jesus' earthly death. On Easter Sunday, the crosses will be uncovered or draped in white, in celebration of the resurrection. Lent, Passion, and Easter are the only times the crosses are draped in the liturgical year. This reminds us of the redemptive purpose of Jesus' suffering (purple), crucifixion (red), death (black), and resurrection (white), which these liturgical seasons commemorate. The rest of the year the cross is uncovered to assure us that Jesus is risen.



*Gospel Lesson

Luke 22:47-53

While he was still speaking, suddenly a crowd came, and the one called Judas, one of the twelve, was leading them. <u>Good Friday – March 29</u>

NOON – Liturgy for Good Friday in the Sanctuary A quiet, solemn service of scripture and song recalling the final day of Jesus' earthly life. This service typically lasts no longer than 50 minutes, perfect for working professionals. Rev. Jeff Bayne will be our guest preacher.

6:30 рм – Service of Tenebrae in the Sanctuary The service of Tenebrae, from the Latin meaning "darkness," makes use of gradually diminishing light, scripture readings, and sacred music to symbolize the events of Jesus' last week on earth. The service concludes in total darkness, as the Christ candle is taken from the Sanctuary, symbolizing the death of Jesus.

Easter Sunday – March 31

9:00 am Service of Holy Communion for Children and Families in the Sanctuary A joyful, abbreviated worship service of scripture, song, and Holy Communion – perfect for families with young children. A nursery is available for children age 4 and younger.

10:30 AM Service of Holy Communion with Orchestra in the Sanctuary A joyful worship experience celebrating the resurrection in scripture, beautiful music enhanced by chamber orchrestra, and Holy Communion. The Atrium will be open for children age 3 through 5th grade; students will rejoin the congregation for the communion liturgy. A nursery is available for children age 4 and younger.
