The service of Tenebrae, which is Latin for "shadows" or "darkness," provides an extended meditation on the cross of Christ. This is a solemn opportunity to reflect on the passion and suffering of Jesus, who was killed at human hands. Through the reading of scripture and the successive extinguishing of light in the sanctuary, we are invited to enter into the dramatic narrative of Jesus' betrayal, arrest, and crucifixion.
